King County's First Repair Event in Sammamish will be June 19 at Sammamish Library

As part of King County's efforts to keep stuff out of the landfill, conserve resources and save you money they hold Repair Events at various locations throughout the year. These FREE events bring in experienced repair people, or "fixers," who will work on your items, repairing or mending them if they can, and often giving you useful advice as well!

People bring in lamps, vacuums, fans, chairs, tables, tools, computers, music players, TVs, blenders, toasters, toys, pants, dresses, rugs, bags, and much more! **You must be present during the repair** and there are no guarantees an item can be fixed, or that attempting to fix it won't break it even more.

Please only bring items small enough to be easily carried in by one person. Do not bring any items that are leaking, dangerous, contain gasoline, or have a strong odor. Clothing and other textiles you bring in for mending should be washed first.

All King County repair events are first-come, first-served, with no appointments or set times. But please contact us in advance if possible to let us know what you plan to bring, so our fixers can be prepared. For specialized repairs (which many are), please bring any specific parts or materials needed for your repair.

Public Works Construction Updates for May 10 - 17, 2019

Citywide Traffic Counts Continue

On Sunday, April 28, the City's traffic counts consultant began placing tube counting equipment on roadways citywide to conduct our annual Traffic Counts Program. Equipment at each location typically lasts through an entire 7-day period. Potential impacts may include the noise from tires going over the rubber tubes, especially on high volume roads.

After the first 7-day period round, counting equipment will be moved to other locations and on until done.

Traffic counts are programmed to be completed by the end of May.

In addition to locations with rubber tube, video counting equipment will be placed at several intersections. Video equipment do not pose any kind of impact, except from getting the attention of curious minds.

Costea Estates

Beginning on Monday, April 29, contractors began installing storm drain pipes along **248th Ave. NE and SE 24th Street**. The work will begin along SE 24th Street and

then proceed to 248th Ave SE. **During this work the roadway will be closed down to one lane of traffic between the hours of 7:00 am and 4:00 pm.** This work is expected to last three weeks.

SE 4th Street Improvements

The City is making improvements to SE 4th Street from 228th to 218th. Improvements include sidewalks, bike lanes, street lighting, landscaping, roundabouts, and sewer and water main upgrades. We anticipate this project will last through Spring of 2020. The road is now open to traffic, but there will be times where only one lane is open (controlled by flaggers) between the hours of 7:00 am and 5:00 pm. Please consider alternate routes for your travel plans.

228th Turn Lane Extensions

The City has finished constructing left turn pocket extensions along 228th with only minor items remaining such as the reflective buttons. Locations include NE 8th, NE 4th, SE 8th, and the entrance to Discovery Elementary.

Expect to see intermittent lane closures between 9:00am and 3:00 pm until the project is completed.

The Issaquah-Fall City Road Project

This project is now out for bid; we're hoping to have a groundbreaking ceremony early this summer!
